New Business-

- Review the appointment of Ray Lanier
 - Ray gave a brief introduction of himself and his experience that he offers to the Technology Committee

Other Business-

- Discussion on last mile solutions
 - Althea was presented as a viable option that could be up and coming
 - Uses radio of approximately a 3 mi radius "chained" together or "piggybacking" one another.
 - Support model? Althea provides support for their systems. For more information: www.althea.net
- Update on Starlink
 - \$500 for the initial cost (terminal), no data cap (in-beta), moving to 10 Gigabit service, perhaps \$50-60 per month in the future.
 - o In beta so install is do-it-yourself. May be different in the future.
 - Could be an opportunity for local jobs.
 - o Could use a cell phone as "catcher"
 - Starlink is a cable based tech which attaches to an antenna, self-orienting, and "user-friendly"
 - Uses cellphone app to tell you if the antenna is receiving or facing the correct direction.
 - Now that Starlink has actual data, tech in the area, the CUD ought to consider the options. However, we need more data.

- Questions on: install, reliability, value in working with the CUD, up and down times.
- To pilot Starlink was looking for 30 residences within a 3 mile radius the town center
- The CUD could bring reduced acquisition costs by having "feet on the ground"
 - Giving Starlink money from the state for base-stations.
- Comparable prices for Kingdom Fiber connection (\$500)
 - Will be meeting with CUD in February
- The NEK CUD could do both (Starlink and Fiber) as the time frames allow as a multi-technology solution.
- Would like to receive continued data
- We would like to present a technology committee offering to have 30-40 addresses available for Starlink and see if they are prepared to reach into Vermont in a more tangible way via Mike Gaiss
- One initiative within the CUD is to promote local jobs and increase the local economy.
